Check with your doctor or pharmacist before giving any other medicines to your child. This includes herbal medicines.

You can give paracetamol (Pamol®, Paracare®) or ibuprofen (Fenpaed®) while your child is taking macrogol unless your doctor has told you not to.

General advice about macrogol

- Do not change the dose without talking to your doctor or nurse first.
- Give macrogol at the same time each day.
- Only give the macrogol to your child.
- Order a new prescription a few days before you run out.
- Check the macrogol has not reached its 'used by' date before giving.
- Macrogol is a medicine that requires special authority, this means that your child's doctor needs to fill out a form for the macrogol before it is subsidised from a retail pharmacy.

Where should I keep the macrogol?

- Keep unopened macrogol sachets in a cupboard, away from heat and sunlight.
- A prepared mixture of macrogol should be covered and stored in the fridge.
- Discard made up mixture after 24 hours.
- Make sure that children cannot see or reach it.
- Keep macrogol in the original sachet until it is needed.

Where to go for more information:

The doctor, pharmacist or nurse can give you more information about macrogol and other medicines for disimpaction and maintenance.

If your baby/child has a rash, swelling of the face, lips, tongue or throat, or has difficulty breathing or swallowing, they may be allergic to macrogol. Contact your doctor or take your child to hospital **immediately.**

For constipation and disimpaction in children

What you need to know

What is macrogol?

 Macrogol is a type of laxative and should help to produce a soft bowel motion (poo). It is used for very bad constipation, called faecal impaction.
 Macrogol is also used as a maintenance therapy to prevent the reoccurrence of faecal impaction.

What is macrogol available as?

Sachets (Lax-sachets[®], Movicol[®])

How much macrogol do I give?

When using macrogol for disimpaction it is common to produce large watery poos. This means the medicine is working and the dose may be reduced.

- Ongoing maintenance therapy: Take ______
 sachets daily to produce soft stools.
- Your doctor or nurse might refer you to other constipation resources, the 'Bristol Stool Chart' and ask for a toileting diary as part of the management plan.

It is important that you follow your doctor's instructions on how much to give. Your plan may have to be adjusted, so your child produces regular stools

How should I give macrogol?

- Open the sachet and pour contents into at least 125ml water(half a glass)
- Stir well until all the powder has dissolved and the mixture is clear or slightly cloudy
- A prepared mixture of macrogol 3350 should be covered and stored in the fridge and discarded after 24 hours.
- A flavour such as orange squash can be added to the drink if your child does not like the taste.
- Macrogol can be given at any time of the day.
- If your child needs to take the medicine at school, you can make the mixture at home for your child to take to school.

When should the medicine start working?

 It may be a few hours or sometimes a day or more before your child produces a soft poo. This will depend on how bad the constipation is.
 Your Doctor may give you a plan to give more sachets in a day if the macrogol does not appear to be working.

What if my child vomits?

- If your child vomits less than 30 minutes after taking a dose, give the same dose again.
- If your child vomits more than 30 minutes after taking a dose, wait until the next dose is due.

What if I forget to give macrogol?

• If you forget to give your child a dose, give it as soon as you remember.

What if I give too much macrogol?

- It is unlikely to cause your child any harm.
- If you are worried that too much was given, please contact the number on the back of the pamphlet.

Are there any side effects?

We use medicines to make children better, but sometimes they have unwanted effects.

Macrogol 3350 usually causes only mild side effects such as:

Wind, diarrhea, cramps, nausea and bloating.
